YOUR ORGANIZERS

Pop-Up Adventure Play began in 2010 with the intention of developing a holistic, low-cost and community-based approach to supporting children's play. Our goal from the beginning was to create introductory models for people to begin rebuilding community around play, at the grassroots level. Today, we are proud to also offer ongoing support and training, and to be encouraging the growth of an international community of playwork students and practitioners in person and online.

At pop-up adventure playgrounds, children of all ages, backgrounds and abilities can explore, transform, create and destroy in a safe, supportive environment. Inherently joyful and inclusive, these events powerfully demonstrate the value and social potential of play in the public sphere. We work with a variety of stakeholders in children's lives, including city parks and recreation teams, art galleries and museum staff, family support organisations and health specialists, as well as parents and children themselves, to improve children's opportunities for play throughout their lives.

We currently support independent pop-up adventure playground organisers in more than a twenty countries around the world, including the US, UK, Colombia, Egypt and Mexico In 2014, we toured the USA In 2015 we toured Australia, and then carried on going, around the world In summer 2017, we will visit sites from east to west across Canada

We recognise that the barriers children face to their play are complex and multifaceted. The pop-up adventure playground model is not a complete solution, but it is a place for organisers to start. These events have proved very effective in welcoming local residents to a conversation about risk, freedom and enjoyment, and helped people of all ages reconnect around play Many organisers who began with pop-ups are now leading on-going programs or weaving play support into their work in other settings, or developing permanent adventure playground sites We profiled several in our book The New Adventure Playground Movement How Communities across the USA are Returning Risk and Freedom to Childhood.

In our 7th year of supporting play and playwork internationally, we are extremely proud to cohost the first-ever playwork conference in the USA.

YOUR HOSTS

Santa Clarita Valley (SCV) Adventure Play is a group that advocates free play for children and adults We believe that physical and mental space for free play is an essential piece of a healthy and happy life, as well as access to nature, a supportive community, and a measure of the benefits of risk.

Since our formation in 2014, SCV Adventure Play has held numerous pop-up adventure playgrounds throughout Los Angeles County for private and public events. We have presented at numerous colleges, symposiums, and community centres on the topic of playwork and its benefits in the public and domestic space. We recently partnered with Santa Clarita Valley International Charter school and ran a loose parts recess initiative for their K1-8th grades. Our story was published in Pop-Up Adventure Play's The New Adventure Play Movement How Communities Across the USA are Returning Risk and Freedom to Childhood and will be included in upcoming publications by Joan Almon.

Santa Clarita Valley Adventure Play was founded by Jeremiah Dockray and Erica Larsen-Dockray in 2014. After more than ten years of working in post production in the reality TV industry, Jeremiah began pursuing a career in playwork and working with kids In addition to managing SCV Adventure Play, he also is a preschool teacher at A Little Patch of Earth Preschool in Newhall, CA Alongside the adventure play business and her art practice. Erica is an adjunct faculty of experimental animation at the California Institute of the Arts, is a teaching artists at Inner-city Arts, and directs her co-founded Calibraska summer animation and art workshops in her hometown of Scottsbluff, NE

While working on a playwork course assignment in 2014, Jeremiah came across an abandoned 2 acre park in their community of Val Verde, CA which is now the developing home of Eureka Villa Adventure Playground. It will be the only adventure playground in Los Angeles County and the seventh permanent site in the US

Professor of Playwork, and head of the UK's oldest playwork department (Leeds Beckett University) His extensive research and practical knowledge spans many years and has proved crucial in establishing Playwork as a recognised, professional field of study.

He is author of Playwork: Theory and Practice, co-author of Rethinking Children's Play and editor of Foundations of Playwork Practice. Jill Wood holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art and a Masters of Library and Information Science from the University of Texas at Austin. She is founder and Director of Adventure Play, an after school program at The Parish School, designed to support exploratory, free play, and co-founder of Bayou City Play, an organisation that promotes child-directed play through temporary loose parts playgrounds at Shriner's Hospital for Children, and in public spaces throughout the City of Houston. She is also a school librarian and dreams of creating a combined book/playmobile on wheels.

Jeremiah Dockray is a preschool teacher and playworker, TV and film editor, and a co-founder of SCV Adventure Play and Eureka Villa In 2012, he discovered the concept of Adventure Playgrounds, and while fulfilling an assignment for the Playworker Development Course Jeremiah discovered a 30 year abandoned park in his community of Val Verde, CA A few months later Eureka Villa was born as Jeremiah and his wife Erica purchased the plot to develop into the seventh permanent adventure playground in the US and the first in Los Angeles County. Currently Jeremiah devotes the majority of his time to developing SCV Adventure play through offering consultations, pop-up adventure playgrounds, Eureka Villa site visits and presentations on the importance of play. He has presented at the Ithaca Play Symposium, CalArts, and College of the Canyons

ERICA LARSEN-DOCKRAY

Erica Larsen-Dockray is a native of Scottsbluff, NE Aside from Co-Founding SCV Adventure Play, Erica is currently an adjunct faculty at her alma mater, the California Institute of the Arts (CalArts), in the Film/Video school's experimental animation program where she teaches under camera animation techniques and critical studies of female representation in animation. In addition to her work as a teaching artist, Erica has co-founded Calibraska Arts Initiative where she returns to her home state with California based artists to facilitate multi-generational summer art camps. She also is a founding member of the North American Adventure Play Association, serves as the Public Relations Director on the Val Verde Civic Association and is a leader on the Santa Clarita Valley CalArts Alumni Chapter.

At the same time, she helped to found Pop-Up Adventure Play in both the UK and US, and was Lead Playworker during a 2-month residency on Governors Island in NYC. Based in the UK, she is currently working towards her PhD in Playwork at Leeds Beckett University. At Pop-Up Adventure Play, she leads on project coordination including all four Pop-Ups Tours, and manages online communications for all social media platforms.

Morgan trained as a playworker and play ranger in London, first with Penny Wilson and then Bob Hughes. In 2010, she co-founded Pop-Up Adventure Play US to address the lack of playwork knowledge in her home country. Since then she has presented at over a dozen conferences, including the keynote at the Children's Development Forum in Bogota, and trained frontline staff at new and established sites. At Pop-Up Adventure Play, Morgan leads on training and coordinates writing projects such as The Loose Parts Manual, the Pop-Up Play Shop Toolkit and a chapter in the recently released book "Playing It Up - With Loose Parts, Playpods, and Adventure Playgrounds" Morgan is based in the US but also working towards a PhD at Leeds Beckett University in the UK Together, Morgan and Suzanna designed and delivered the Playworker Development Course, and completed tours of the US, Australia, and the world.

Prior to The New Children's Museum, Megan spent ten years at Boston's Children's Museum developing pop-up play spaces in urban parks, health-focused interventions in public housing, and numerous exhibits and programs. Her work as an artist and independent curator focuses on public art, and has included such projects as the Bumpkin Island Art Encampment, a five-day island-bound arts residency in Boston Harbor, and Willy Wonka in Smellovision, a series of outdoor film screenings with choreographed scent deployments. Megan holds a BA in History from the University of California, Los Angeles and an MA in Play and Playwork from the University of Gloucestershire, and writes and publishes regularly about art, play and playwork. Chris is a UK based playworker, play writer/researcher, and playwork activist He has an MA in Play and Playwork and is currently starting fieldwork for his PhD, examining the interaction between children and mobile digital technology in their outdoor play He is on the board of the International Play Association (England, Wales and Northern Ireland), a postgraduate fellow of the Royal Geographical Society (with Institute of British Geographers), and has published and delivered academic and professional papers in the UK and internationally. He has extensive knowledge and expertise in national workforce development, facilitated the All Party Parliamentary Group on Play, and for over ten years was National Playwork Convenor for the Community, Youth and Playworker's Section of Unite the Union, the UK's largest Trade Union Before that he was chair of the Association of Playworkers (England) He has played an active role on the UK Play Safety Forum, Play Policy Forum, and on Play England's former Strategic Advisory Board In his spare time he cooks a mean curry, plays in a post-punk band and holds a black belt in Taekwon-Do.

Simon Rix, UK: Self-professed "dangerous radical", Simon has been part of the UK's playwork scene since the age of 17. He has worked on many adventure playgrounds across London, designed consultation programs and worked to inform government policy Simon co-founded Design and Build (Play), an organization which trains playworkers in construction with children. He now runs Meriden Adventure Playground, a multifaceted community project and adventure playground in Solihull, which is thriving in spite of the difficult context of political austerity. Through this project, he is also involved in research linking adventure playgrounds with public health and fostering resilience. Meriden was also a partner in a film made by the art group Assemble Collective. He regards the adventure playground as a constructed situation which is both disruptive and compensatory, as they both 'rattle the cage of the spectacle' and compensate for environmental deficiencies in the daily lives of children and other community members.

Luke has given talks on The Land, playwork and various theories from Cardiff to Eastbourne to Tokyo He has been a trainee playworker, fully qualified playworker, Resource Officer, Senior Inclusion Playworker and a Senior playworker; where he oversaw the running of five different projects in five different communities. His writings on Environmental Modifications have been published in the Journal of Playwork Practice. He hasn't managed an Adventure Playground yet! A playworker for five and a half years, Luke worked at The Land before, during and after its inception. He has now left to travel the world and explore practice in other countries, and misses the team and kids greatly. At Campference, he'll be telling a series of stories that will hopefully illustrate what makes The Land such a special and unique place. 
